3.1	Harringay Curriculum: The review is still on-going and		
	members of the team are attending other schools to see it in		
	practice. Subject leads will then review the curriculum and		
	cater the programme to suit the school better. CS explained		
	how it would then fit into remaining curriculum plans. Writing group is now established and looking at how the units and		
	programmes are fitting together. The group is made of		
	teachers, not subject leaders, so the work can be used as		
	CPD. There has been a lot of enrichment but next year this		
	needs to be mapped out further.

5.	Monitor Absence and Attendance Data		
5.1	CS shared the latest attendance data, which highlighted that		
	the school attendance is above national. CS informed the		
	committee that the LA attendance officer had a meeting with		
	CS and the School Secretary and they were happy with the		
	attendance data. CS shared there was lots of guidance but the		
	approach is to work with parents as much as possible in a		
	holistic approach. LA have released further example letters for		
	the school to use. The school is also looking into offering a		
	breakfast on a Friday to help support families.

CS reassured the committee that the attendance was good but there is scope to improve. CS confirmed it was being increasingly seen and explained the reasons behind it are anxiety and parental responsibility. CHALLENGE: HW raised whether the policy needs to clarify that staff, as parents, still need to go through official channels for school communication, which CS stated was included in the Staff Code Of Conduct.
