2.	Minutes and action points from the meeting held on 4 th May 2023		
2.1	The minutes from the meeting held on the 4 th May were signed as an accurate and true record.		
2.2	There were no action points.		
3.	Head's Report		
3.1	It has been a busy term of assessment including SATs, phonics, times tables checks and general end of year assessments. Sports day was delayed due to the weather, but other trips have still been completed across KS1. The English lead has been working with staff across the school to ensure there is cohesion and best working practice across the school. Pixl programme is going ahead, Emily Broadhurst and Lesley Dixon attended a conference regarding it. EB will lead with LD support and the plan is to introduce the assessments and then build other aspects in to ensure it is embedded fully. Teachers have been informed of the class structure for next year and move up days and open classrooms events are planned.		
3.2	CS shared the most recent attendance data in a printed report as well as the same report from last year for governor comparison. All attendance data is above national, which is the same as the previous year. CS highlighted the only noticeable change is amongst SEN/EHCP pupils and explained the reasons behind this. Generally there is more of an issue around punctuality, which is being addressed. Persistent absences are being looked at and different strategies are being looked at to target this with the support of the LA. CHALLENGE: ND	CHALLENGE	

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	raised that with the EHCP is a small group but with a big impact, which CS discussed on how these pupils are being targeted and how the data compares to national. CHALLENGE: HW asked why there was a decrease in attendance in the current year 6 from when they were in year 5, which CS explained the reasons for the decrease. CHALLENGE: DW asked what the definition of persistent absence was, which CS confirmed it was below 95%. CHALLENGE: HW raised that this data was informative and could be used to drill down into peak period of absentees, which CS explained some of the peak absence periods from this years data.
